

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

At the YMCA Center for Youth Voice (CYV), we share your goal of providing extracurricular activities that help students strengthen their character and skills, leading to greater success in school and life. In part, our commitment comes from personal experience - each of us on the CYV team benefitted from participating in school-based activities, including show choir, athletics, robotics, debate, and theater. It also comes from listening to the young people who participate in the YMCA Youth in Government (YIG) and Model United Nations (MUN) programs every year. "YIG makes me feel like I belong somewhere. It has given me self-confidence. It gives me something I can be truly passionate about. I have met my best friends through the program. It has taught me how to be a leader and a good follower."

As an Activities Director, you work hard every day to deliver important developmental programs and experiences that enrich a student's middle and high school experience. We are hoping you will consider including Youth in Government and Model United Nations in your school's roster of approved activities.

If you are not familiar with them, YIG and MUN are simulation-based civic education programs that allow middle and high school students to serve in model governments at the local, state, national and international levels. In Minnesota, the YMCA Center for Youth Voice partners with secondary teachers statewide to build school-based student delegations. Each student is a part of a designated program area, and has responsibilities for preparing materials that will be shared at either the YIG conference in January or the MUN conference in late March. Some students participate in both conferences; some choose to only participate in one. Both conferences include focused discussions on current issues, a wide variety of social events, engaging evening activities, time for small-group reflection, and chances for recognition.

Both programs lean heavily on the concept of youth-adult partnership, and we ask participating students to step up and step in to ensure the program's success. However, we also need an adult leader – most often a teacher – to help coordinate, prepare, and support the students in the delegation. We think including Youth in



Government and Model United Nations in your district's list of approved extracurricular activities can be a win-win:

- · You expand your district's activities portfolio with proven, high-quality programs
- Teachers feel recognized and rewarded for the time and effort they put into ensuring student success in the same way you do when you contract them to coach a team or direct a play
- Students seeking this kind of experience find a place both to belong and to further develop the skills they will use as community members, as adults, and as local and global citizens.
